

UPPER DUNBAR LAKES

- A Wildlife Management Area covers most of the Columbia Wetlands from the southern boundary, north to Donald.

Reserve covers a significant portion (53,632 ha) of the Beaverfoot Valley

- A Notation of Interest is located on the east side of the Columbia Wetlands from the Kicking Horse River to the Blaeberry River.


- Access to trapping/hunting/guiding tenures should be maintained

- Limited Entry Hunting Tenures and Guide Outfitter Areas cover 2/3 of the study area covering the South and Central Focus Areas north to Windy Creek, and Stovepipe Mountain. Trapping Areas cover almost the entire study area. This traditional land use has existed for many years and access to these areas should not be further limited by the Trails Strategy.

- Forestry and Recreation Roads provide access to every valley within the study area. However as forestry activities cease in certain areas, the roads are not maintained and vehicular access to trails and recreation areas becomes limited. Planning for road decommissioning and developing methods for maintaining access to trail areas should be considered in trails

- Backcountry cabins (Ski touring, heli ski, Alpine Club of Canada, etc.) could provide important amenity and communication points along multi-day backcountry trails year round.



CSRD Trails Strategy Emerging Trends - South Area

Motorized access has been limited by the fire ban and off-road vehicle access restrictions
 Opportunity to develop and maintain Pass adventure trails and connections to National Parks rather than out and back trails. This type of adventure is gaining popularity and offers benefits from a tourism perspective. Example Harrogate Pass

- The desire for an established Summer Motorized Vehicle network with proper mapping, way finding signage, and staging areas.
- Range Tenures cover areas in the South Focus Area and must be considered in future trail planning.
- Section 58 Polygons Recreational Orders restrict specific uses from certain areas. ROs limiting snowmobile use exist within the Upper Spillimacheen
- Active Cattle Range Tenures cover a large part of the South Focus Area primarily south of the Columbia River, with some smaller tenure areas occurring in the McMurdo/Fraling Sub Focus Area.
- Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) exists in the Columbia Valley from the Southern Focus Area Boundary to approximately Nicholson, with a few scattered parcels around the Town of Golden. There are several parcels of ALR in and around the Blaeberry Valley and one located West-North-West of Donald. Future trails in this area must comply with ALR regulations and consider potential impacts on agricultural production and potential impacts on existing trails with intensified future agricultural use.
